## Boil Water Advisory issued after water main break on Union St. in Spartanburg

SPARTANBURG – On Thursday, July 24, Spartanburg Water System (SWS) experienced a water main break in the Union St. area of Spartanburg, near the entrance to Duncan Park. A contractor has been working in the area to replace the aged water line. The break caused some customers to experience an interruption of service or low water pressure.

Repairs have been made and the affected area has been thoroughly flushed and test results taken. This includes the flushing of fire hydrants. As a precautionary measure, after water service has been restored, and test results can be reviewed, customers are advised to boil water intended for drinking or cooking vigorously for at least one (1) full minute prior to use. Also, any ice made from water that has not been boiled should not be used for drinking purposes.

This advisory will remain in effect until further notice.
